The Market House

In 2018, a volunteer team of stewards welcomed well over 400 visitors to Newent's Market House to view the exhibition and artefacts at weekends during the tourist season. Built in 1668 as a butter market, Newent's Market House replaced a previous market house which

occupied a location near to the site of the present library. Located at the town's original crossroad, it remains true to its original design, bar the addition of the rounded extension on the south east end, added in 1864 by Lord of the Manor, Richard Foley

Planning Matters

The Town Council has no veto over planning applications, but we scrutinise them and make recommendations. Importantly we can act as a first point of contact when residents have concerns about construction activity.

Recently we have been approached by a resident who had witnessed traffic hazards caused by tipper lorries, and a farmer whose ditches are being eroded by large volumes of water draining off a new housing development. Councillors and the Town Clerk can put people in touch with the appropriate agencies and make representations on their behalf.

We also encourage developers to present their ideas to us right at the outset, to reduce the chances of encountering objections later.
